As part of the Governors' Strategy Session, an annual event when the Governors meet up with the Head Teacher and the Leadership Team, we as Governors get the opportunity to experience at first-hand what is being done in school to continually improve the way in which our pupils are taught.

Yesterday Maths was on the timetable. There were a few nervous Governors, myself included as Baseline Screening Test sheets were handed out! Once attempted, we then worked our way around the room taking part in a series of different exercises. These were all part of Snap Maths which the school uses as an intervention to help develop Maths skills.

I was struck by just how imaginative one can be when teaching number recognition. With examples of numbers up to 5 or 10 we used a drum, cards pegged on a washing line with hand puppets, play dough birthday cakes with candles, and numbered birthday cards, all ways of helping to reinforce the number learning. Rhona even had us singing for our supper with her exercise, which involved both participation and coordination. The ideas were fun, colourful, tactile, unthreatening and easy to relate to, making them accessible to all our pupils. Undertaking such exercises brings us a little closer to understanding how our pupils are taught, something which can only help to make us better Governors.

This exercise was just a small part of an extremely interesting and informative afternoon where Jon and his team showed us what lies beyond an outstanding Ofsted rating for the school.
